Introduction

Welcome to the Social Impact Measurement Network of Australia's (SIMNA Ltd's) 2022-23 Annual Review! This brief report summarises the Network's activities between 1 July 2022 and and 30 June 2023. It also showcases the year's highlights and shows the extent to which we are fulfilling our strategic objectives.

During this period it was great to see increased activity across the country and more inperson events. The Victoria Organising Committee started running events again, and towards the end of the FY, a new committee formed in QLD following a break in activities for several years there. In addition to OC events, we also held two national events: a webinar in partnership with Our Community's Institute of Community Directors on evaluation for the time- and resource-poor in May 2023 and a research webinar on unpacking our options in social impact measurement in June.

Membership has continued to grow, as have the annual SIMNA Awards. The 2022 SIMNA Awards attracted the highest number of unique entries ever! We thank our sponsors, judges and all the entrants. Delivered online, with an in-person watch party in Melbourne, the Awards Ceremony in December 2022 once again brought the social impact measurement sector together to celebrate the incredible work being done across Australia to evidence social change.

SIMNA welcomed the opportunity to contribute to the important conversation on Measuring What Matters in early 2023. In our submission we encouraged further progress to ensure that this endeavour reflects the Principles of Social Value and results in meaningful, actionable information that advances the quality of life of all people living in Australia.

The work of growing the network and delivering its activities is made possible by over 50 incredible volunteers from across the country. A number of new volunteers got involved this year, working alongside our longstanding volunteers, some of whom have been giving their time to SIMNA since we were first getting established. We thank all our volunteers for their valuable contributions as well as all our event speakers and hosts. And we thank all of you, our members, for being an active part of our network and for all the work you do to advance the consideration of social impact measurement in decision making by all organisations.


SIMNA Partners 2022-23










Network Members

The Network is all Around Australia



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
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SIMNA's Strategic Approach

Steps to Measure our Impact

SIMNA has an Impact Measurement Working Group, which met six times in FY2022-2023. The group has been working towards implementing the monitoring and evaluation framework for SIMNA as an organisation, to inform how we nurture our dynamic network to deliver meaningful impact. The group is currently supporting the delivery of impact measurement comprising:

- Annual narrative data collection from network members, based on a Most Significant Change approach
- Ongoing monitoring of feedback and member profile data, including advising on questions and approaches for data collection
- Integrating developmental evaluation approaches as part of the development of new SIMNA products and initiatives

In FY2023-24 the group is delivering the full impact measurement approach, including narrative data collection in early 2024 for analysis and reporting to the board.

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
SIMNA Organising Committees

Organising Committees are Advisory Groups to the Board. They create the places for SIMNA members to meet, connect, learn, share and support.
